STUDENTS FEED BACK REPORT ON LECTURERS / COLLEGE

- ❖ Student's feedback on teachers at the end of the year helps to improve and refine the teaching. This provide the teachers an opportunity to introspect their strengths and lapses and can conduct himself accordingly As such students feedback on teachers, college is taken at the end of the year / Semester.
- ❖ Every teacher is evaluated in terms of the punctuality to classes, teaching methods adopted (traditional, ICT) provision of teaching materials conduct of internal exams, evaluation, performance, grievance redressed, encouragement in extracurricular activities etc.
- These feedback forms filled up by the students are collected back and appropriate measures are taken to solve the problems of students.
- ❖ A similar feedback is taken from the students on the facilities provided by the college like infrastructure, academic and administrative functioning of the college, the support of the principal, teaching & nonteaching staffs, library, NCC, NSS activities, water supply, toilets, scholarship disbursement, Buss pass/Train pass facility.
- ❖ Parents meet is also conducted every year and feedback of the parents about the performance of the teaching, nonteaching is obtained during the meet both orally and in writing. These feedbacks are submitted to the management for the necessary follow-up.
- ❖ A feedback on the CBCS pattern introduced from 2015 is taken from the staff and the students. Most of the students & staffs preferred annual examination patterns to the CBCS as they could not find time to revise the syllabus before the exams. With the introduction of CBCS a continuous internal evaluation in the form of seminars, assignments, mid exams leave no time for the revision. The pattern is yet to be streamlined to reap benefits to the students.

Best Practices

Conducting Field trips - Historical / Botanical / Industrial

CONTEXT:

Organizing field trips are very essential and are a part of institutional activities as they give real world experience to the students. Students can coordinate what they learn in the classrooms with what they see in the world around them and this consolidates learning and complements academic concepts.

PRACTICE:

The college is conducting academic trips of historical, biological, industrial importance every year. Field trips to nearby places and units that have relevance to curriculum are also being conducted

In the year 2015-16 a historical tour to Amaravathi, Nagarjuna Sagar was conducted for degree students. The students accompanied by the concerned staff visited Amaralingeswara temple on the bank of river Krishna and the irrestibletable Dhyana Buddha Statue. They also visited museums at Amaravathi which housed the valuable architecture, statues relic's inscriptions and majestic Buddhist monuments, galleries. The colossal Sagar dam built across River Krishna and one of the largest one in Asia supplies water for irrigation and also for hydro electric generation was also visited.

In 2016-17 a Historical tour to kuchipudi - the place which gave birth to the world famous classical dance genre 'kuchipudi' and its pioneers like siddhendra yogi vempati satyam and Movva- the birth place of a great litterateur 'kshetrayya', srikakulum- the capital of Andhra sathevahana kingdom, where sri Krishna Deva Raya wrote the famous 'Amuktamalyada ' and Hamsala Devi' the confluence of River Krishna with the Bay of Bengal was conducted.

SUCCESS:

These trips enabled students to gain practical knowledge. The science departments like chemistry, zoology and commerce are taking students to nearby factories (Jute mills, Cotton mills, Soap, Plastic industries) Sugar factory, Kolleru labs, lakes, silk cocoon reeling centres. These trips are learning oriented and the rewarding educational experience help to improve students social & life skills

PROBLEM:

Organizing field trips are expensive as students cannot afford the minimum expenses also since they are economically deprived. The UGC grants allotted for this purpose are supportive to some extent and the main burden lies with the college

Encouragement to Merit Students:

CONTEXT:

The institution's Management, staff and donors instituted Gold Medals, Cash Prizes and Book prizes to encourage the meritorious performance of students in public exams. Some of the Retired staff members and donors deposited amount in FD and the annual interest accrued is given to economically backward merit students

PRACTICE:

A very transparent system of evaluation is adapted. The details of prizes and the names of the donors are given in the college calendar

Two Gold Medals, Cash Prizes worth of 20,000/- and 20 Book prizes are presented to top scorers in all streams of Intermediate and Degree courses Besides the endowment prizes, the college is presenting academic prizes to First & Second top scorers in final exams.

Awards act as catalysts and boost up the confidence of the students. The incentives in the form of kind and cash create a healthy environment and promote the competitive spirit among the learners and that give them a sense of satisfaction and pride
